BRITISH troops are making the biggest sacrifices in Afghanistanwhile being pald some of the worst wages.

UK forces patrolling dangerous Helmand are earning less than Lithuanians doing reconstruction work in peaceful provinces and Belgians guarding Kabul airport.

Our heroes earn £20,581 a year—20 per cent BELOW the UK national average wage of £25,879—plus £5,280 tax free for every six-month tour of duty.

But Lithuanian troops based in relatively safe Ginor province earn £15,932, 2.6 times their national average of £6,110, and pocket £1,594 extra for every month in a war zone.

Belgians take home £27,682—ten per cent above their national average of £24,880—and see salaries TRIPLED for each month in Afghanistan.

The same comparisons show Brit squaddles fare worse than those from Denmark, italy, Romania, Luxembourg, Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

And while they earn silghtly more than US troops, American benefits dwarf ours with Afghanistan veterans receiving free university tuitton, which can be passed on to familles.

Only the children of UK personnel who have died in combat are eligible for college help.

I feel betrayed by my country

A TEARFUL widow whose hero husband was killed on the frontline today accuses Prime Minister David Cameron of "the ultimate betrayal".

Devastated Kirianne Curley, 28, was left to bring up the couple's newborn son alone after Royal Marine husband Stephen was killed in a horrific explosion in Afghanistan last May.

She was distraught at what the future might hold for her and baby William.

But just four weeks later Mr Cameron made his promise to look after those left behind by our war dead by making the Millitary Covenant on welfare a legal order.

He even wrote a sympathetic note to Kirianne, pledging: "If there is anything at all I can do to help, please contact me."

INSULT

But now Kirianne's hopes are shattered after the Government U-turn on the PM'S vow. She said: "I've gone from having dual income to none and now have a baby to provide for.

"David Cameron's betrayal is insulting and disrespectful to lives that have been lost. It's a blatant injustic."

Furiously, she added: "Cameron didn't lose his home, his future and his security all at once. I hung on every word he said when he promised to look after us.

"I am so angry that he has betrayed his promise to me. He said we'd be looked after and we aren't. For that, I cannot forgive him."

A HERO who risked his life with THREE tours of duty in Afghanistan today reveals why our troops feel so badly let down by the Government.

"We always thought we'd be looked after and, if we got killed, so would our families," said the soldier, who we cannot identify but are calling John.

"But close friends of mlne have been killed and I've seen how badly their wives and familles were treated. That takes the fight out of the lads.

"It's a betrayal of those who gave their lives for this country."

Now John, who returned last year from deadly Sangin, in Helmand province, is adding his firepower to our Justice For The Brave campaign, saying: "I fully support it."

The News of the World crusade demands that the Military Covenant, which pledges special rights to forces personnel and their families, be enshrined in law. That would GUARANTEE them prioritised health care, decent housing, first choice schools and widows' pensions, among other rewards for their sacrifices.

But John has no faith in empty promises from PM David Cameron or the Ministry of Defence.

He said: "What the failure to make the Military Covenant law tells us is that this Government is not serious about the war in Afghanistan and has absolutely no respect for its armed forces fighting out there."

John claims our forces are still suffering from lack of proper equipment and too few troops.

Sadly, he explains: "My last tour was the bloodiest yet and a lot of the deaths could've been avoided.
"I have spoken to friends out there now and nothing has changed. I had one enemy sniper who was firing at our patrol base for days. He'd shoot through holes made through three separate walls and it was impossible to fire back.

made through three separate walls and it was impossible to fire back. He killed one of our lads but when we requested mortar fire our requests were denied.

"In fact, not one mortar was fired in the whole tour. We didn't even have air support. It's a full-blown war out there but It seems people making these rules have no idea."

John claims our troops were not even allowed to attack Taliban planting bombs. He said: 'I've been sat in a sangar (sentry post) in Sangin literally watching the enemy sowing IEDs into the ground. Yet they were not deemed an imminent threat to our lives.

"I knew we'd be patrolling that very ground the following day so this WAS a threat to our lives but my hands were tied."

John also alleges that, prior to deploying, he asked for his men to be given Vallon metal detectors to train with—but was told they were all our lives but was the said of the said.

"It was pointless—a crutch doesn't make a noise so you learn what's a threat and what isn't." Even more of a shock was how few ATO bomb


a shock was how few ATO bomb disposal experts there were.
John said: "Even though we were locating IEDs on a daily basis, I only ever saw one ATO guy during our whole six-month tour.
"He was so stretched we had to wait 18 hours in searing heat for him to arrive. That put all our lives at risk because, if you stay in one place longer than 20 minutes, the Taliban will hit you-and they did. I don't know how we got out alive.

"After that, when we found an IED we'd just mark it and avoid it. But within an hour the device would be gone. The Taliban would simply move it to try and catch us out."

Last night the MoD pointed out its 10,000 troops are concentrated in a smaller area of Helmand since US forces took over in Sangin last year. "We now have the right strategy in Afghanistan and the resources to carry it out," said a spokesman. "All units deploy with the right equipment, the right training and at the required strength for the tasks they are asked to fulfil."

Last night, armed with our damning dossier of video evidence, Scotland Yard launched their own probe into the scandal.

Millions around the world watched Pakistan star bowlers Mohammad Amir and Mohammad Asif deliver three no-balls in the Test against England on Thursday and Friday at the historic home of cricket, Lord's in London.

Unsuspecting fans packed the ground yesterday to watch Pakistan collapse as they were bowled out for 74 in their first innings and forced to follow on.

Unsuspecting fans packed the ground as they were bowled out for 74 in their But today our shock footage of the players' fixer Mazhar Majeed taking a massive £150,000 cash, and telling us EXACTLY when the no-balls would come, proves the game was RIGGED. Having already trousered a £10,000 upfront deposit—which he insisted had gone to the stars—Majeed sat in our west London hotel room at the Copthorne Tara on Wednesday night and eagerly counted out the £140,000 balance in bundles of crisp £50 notes—our 'entry ticket' into his already successful betting scam.

Our undercover team was posing as front men for a Far East gambling cartel. In return for their suitcase of money Majeed then calmly detailed what would happen—and when—on the field of play next day, as a taster of all the lucrative information he could supply in future. He promised: "I'm going to give you three no-balls to prove to you firstly that this is what's happening. They've all been organised, okay?
"This is EXACTLY what's going to happen, you're going to SEE these three things happen. I'm telling you, if you play this right you're going to make a lot of money, believe me!"

Greed

We can sensationally reveal Majeed identified young Pakistan captain Salman Butt as the ringleader of the band of cheats. He also named wicket keeper Kamran Akmal and boasted he had a total of SEVEN corrupt cricketers in his pocket, all banking huge sums from bookies and betting syndicates.

The scam. fuelled by greed, is a betrayal by the players not only of their sport but of their cricket-crazy homeland.

As millions back home in Pakistan struggle against hunger and disease amid devastating floods, the cheats were defiting the reputation of Lord's and lining their own pockets.

In a meeting with our investigators puppet-master Majeed:

BRAGGED that the scam is rife and future games against England this summer are already earmarked for cheating.

CONFESSED his match-fixing around the world had netted shady customers MILLIONS.

tinnings and forced to follow on.

• REVEALED how he oversees cheating by using no-balls, specifying how many runs will be scored or conceded in certain overs, with signals such as changing gloves to confirm the fix is on.

• ADMITTED he abuses his position as owner of non-league Croydon FC to launder his illicit gains.

• BOASTED he even went on to the field of piay personally to help a bowler tamper with a ball.

At one stage Majeed told us our syndicate could make "absolutely millions, millions" by paying him up to \$450,000 a time for Info on matches, then placing hets on the carefully choreographed

millions" by paying him up to \$450,000 a time for Info on matches, then placing bets on the carefully choreographed outcome. And he tried to excuse the players' shameful behaviour, claiming: "These poor boys need to. They're paid peanuts." Majeed said he had even opened Swiss bank accounts for the cheats to hide their Ill-gotten gains.

We launched our investigation two weeks ago after a tip-off. The Pakistan side has long been dogged by match-fixing allegations. Only today has the full shocking extent been laid bare.

Property tycoon Majeed, 35, has a \$1.8 million home in Surrey and is a familiar face at cricket grounds around the world. We infiltrated his criminal network posing as wealthy businessmen on the make.

Majeed turned up for our first meeting on Monday, August 16, at the Hilton in London's Park Lane, casually dressed in Jeans and a brown sweater. He immediately started bragging of his connections with the Pakistani team. "I manage ten of the players," he told us. "I do all their affairs like contracts, sponsorship, marketing, everything really. I work very closely with the PCB (Pakistan Cricket Board)."

Our reporters told him they wanted to organise their own Twenty20 tournament in the Middle East, Majeed claimed he would be able to provide his piayers for the

Majeed said he was worried our men could be wearing tape recorders and he would check them out before going further.

Two days later at the Bombay Brasserie Indian restaurant in central London, Majeed told us we had begun to gain his trust. He had spent the day at the Oval where

pagun to gain his trust. He had spent the day at the Oval where Pakistan bowled England out for 233 on the first day of the third Test. After a trusted source vouched for our credentials, Majeed relaxed and laid his cards on the table... MAJEED: "I do feel that I can speak to you about this, okay? Now, yes... there is very big money in it." REPORTER: "There's still? I know there was, but they clamped down on match fixing I heard." MAJEED: "They've toned down match fixing a lot, yeah. They've made it very, very difficult. "These guys won't deal with just anybody. The only reason they'll deal with me is because they know I'm professional, they've known me for so many years, yeah.

"I've been doing it with them, the Pakistani team. for about 2½ years. And we've made masses and masses of money." Later that night Majeed boasted how it was the players who got HIM into match-fixing. He told us: "The players would never tell

anybody else. They were the ones who actually approached me about this. This is the beauty of it.
"I was friends with them for four. five years and then they said this happens. I said really?"
Majeed then described how the betting scam operates. He reached into a carrier bag, pulled out a white BlackBerry phone and flicked through a series of messages.

Shady


"I deal with an Indian party," he said. "They pay me for the information." Then Majeed explained how many cricket bets are placed on what he called "brackets"—events happening in a group of 10 overs. If players score well in the first three overs punters would be likely to bet on that continuing for the next seven. But If the fixed players then deliberately STOP scoring or slow down, anybody in on it can "make a killing". said Maleed. The

then deliberately STOP scoring or slow down, anybody in on it can "make a killing", said Majeed. The same happens with bowlers giving away runs or throwing no-balls. Not only is Majeed's information invaluable to syndicates Involved in spread betting—where wagers are staked on a range of possible outcomes—it is also golddust for shady bookies looking to manipulate the odds in their favour.

The following night—Thursday August 19—Majeed demanded \$210,000 then revealed to us there would be two no-balls in the following day's Oval play.

That fix was cancelled on the day. So was a promised maiden over by captain Salman Butt on the Saturday—final day of the Test England lost. But days later—with our extra £140,000 in his hands—he delivered the promised goods at Lord's. Last night a Scotland Yard spokesman said: "Following information from the News of the World we have today arrested a 35-year-old man on suspicion of conspiracy to defraud bookmakers"





THE DOCK: THREE BALLS THAT WILL SHAKE WORLD OF SPORT **IS DE**

are the three no-balls that will be recorded in the statistics books forever-and will be remembered for shaking cricket to its core.

ing cricket to its core.

Millions of fans who watched Pakistan bowlers Mohammad Amir and Mohammad Asif send down the trio of deliveries over two days' play at Lord's, had no idea they were bowled as part of a match-rigging scam.

Incredibly, during live coverage, respected TV and radio pundits exclaimed to worldwide audiences how bad every one of the faked no-balls looked-little knowing they were ordered by money-grabbing fixer Mazhar Majeed, who just a day earlier had collected £150,000 from undercover News of the World reporters.

day earlier had collected £150,000 from undercover News of the World reporters.

And it all played out like clockwork exactly as Majeed promised it would. He claimed the piayers had demanded we pay the cash as our entry ticket into an existing shady gambling syndicate based in India. In return he revealed solid details of the three no-balls he'd planned for the Lord's test.

MAJEED: "There's no risk, there's no signal... these three are definitely happening. They've all been organised, okay? So, the first ball of the third over of the innings, yeah. "Asif and Amir are going to be bowling. Asif is to bowl the first over (meaning he will also bowl the third), yeah?

"Okay? Then the tenth, the last ball... sixth ball of the tenth over." REPORTER: The tenth over. Who's bowling it?

MAJEED; Asif will be bowling it. Majeed then explained that the

third ball would come in the first over that teen wonder boy Amir got to deliver to an England right-hander, after one of the opening two left-handers had been dismissed. Just to convince us Amir was on side Majeed telephoned the young star at his hotel. "Are you sleeping

f***er?," he asked crudely. Amir confirmed that's what he was trying

to do. "Okay,

confirmed that's what he was trying to do.
"Okay, sleep," said Majeed.
"We've spoken about everything before anyway. Okay, don't mind. You sleep."

But when Amir prepared for his day's work at the 4th Test on Thursday morning, he was certainly awake to what was expected of him. Pakistan captain Salman But strolled out to meet England skipper Andrew Strauss in the middle of the ground shortly before the weather-delayed toss at 1.10pm on the opening day of the test.

Pakistan won the toss and elected to put England in to bat. Butt had his customarty huddle with his team but bizarrely did not even bother to inspect the recently uncovered wicket like his opposite number Strauss. As predicted Butt put Amir

Strauss. As predicted Butt put Amir and Asif on to open the bowling. And, as promised, on the FIRST BALL of the THIRD OVER to England opening batsman Aiastair Cook Amir overstepped the white line marking his bowling crease by a huge margin.

Signal

Umpire Billy Bowden immediately raised his arm to signal the no-ball at 1.56pm.
Pakistan's 18-year old rising star had seaied cricket's shame on the pitch once illuminated by legends including WG Grace, lan Botham and Don Bradman. including WG Gra and Don Bradman.

But the sly player brazenly tried to hide the truth, raking the spikes of his boots across the line and ask-

to hide the truth, raking the spikes of his boots across the line and asking for sawdust to be put down as he falsely blamed the no-ball on loose footing.

Bemused Sky commentator Ian Botham exclaimed: "No-ball. Because of the one-dayers, you don't see that too often with the bowlers who play two forms of the game. They've got into the discipline of keeping behind that front line."

The BBC online commentary read: "Dirty great no-ball from Amir, that was fully two feel over."

Seven overs later, yet more disgrace was heaped on the game, as 27-year-old Asif also overstepped the crease on the LAST BALL of the TENTH OVER. He too went through the masquerade of calling for sawdust to dry the ground.

Former England captain Mike Atherton commented: "There's been a couple of biggish no-balls. He was

a couple of biggish no-balls. He was over that front line by a good half a foot or so."

Play was abandoned due to bad light and rain at 5.45pm so the third no-bali promised by Majeed didn't

But after play ended for the day But after play ended for the day Majeed smugly rang our reporter to brag. "You a bit more comfortable now?" he asked. "Told you. Once you showed your hand, I showed my hand, okay?"
Then he revealed how he had arranged another no-ball for the following day's play.

arranged another no-ball for the following day's play.

"Right, it's going to be Amir's third over and third ball," he said.

"It'll be his third over, not the third over of the game." He ended the call by reminding our man:

"Boss, I'm telling you, you're deal-

ing with the right person, you're not dealing with an idiot, all right?" But on Friday morning Majeed

contacted our man saying that he'd received a message from Amir. Majeed said: "He's briefed up. He's just texted me now to say 'Shall I do it or not?"

Blitz

And Amir DID do it-despite getting off to a sensational start, taking three quick wickets in nine balls. Commentators described him as being "on fire" as England wickets tumbled to his pace attack. Amir managed to skittle out England batsmen Kevin Pietersen, Paul Collingwood and Eion Morgan without any of them scoring a single run. It was only the fifth time in history the

only the fifth time in history the third, fourth and fifth batsmen in an order had been dismissed for ducks. During the blitz, former West Indian fast bowler Michael Holding, commentating for Sky, said: "It's been Mohammad Amir's morning, He's made that ball talk."

His colleague Michael Atherton said: "Remarkable stuff this morning from Pakistan and in particular Mohammad Amir. Just 18 years of age. He's running in from the Pavilion End. He's like an old hand.
"He looks like he's going to get a wicket with every ball he bowls."

With Amir tearing through the batsmen, Majeed quickly contacted our man, warning that the promised no-ball might have to be cancelled and that we shouldn't place big bets on it. He said the captain might tell Amir to keep up the onslaught. "So much is happening out there at the

Amir to keep up the onslaught. "So much is happening out there at the moment," he added. Majeed was right-captain Salman Butt. who Majeed boasts is one of his players in the fixing scam-did have a quick word with Amir Just before the THRD BALL of the THRD OVER.

Usually mid-over conversations between bowlers and captains would be about the placement of fielders and whether to any make changes.

On this occasion, no changes were made, prompting commentator Michael Holding to chip in: "A quick conference between captain and the bowler. Hasn't resulted in the field being changed, Not yet." But there WAS a sudden change in Amir's form. As promised, he bowled and again placed his foot over the crease, into the banned

area-a no-ball. The umpire had a word with Amir about the surprise delivery, pointing out how far over

the line his foot had been.
On the TV replay, the side view showed he placed his foot at least eight inches past the line. It prompted bowling legend Michael Holding to exclaim: "How far over was that? Woh!"

Hostile

Ian Botham added: "It's like net bowling"—referring to when bowlers don't try so hard when they are practising in the nets. With his next ball Amir bowled delivery that again caused problems for Jonathan Trott, with both com-mentators saying how good a ball it had been. Test Match Special listen-ers on BBC Radio 4 heard Jonathan

nau been. 1est Match Special listeners on BBC Radio 4 heard Jonathan
Agnew and England legend Geoffrey Boycott recall how Amir had massively overstepped the crease the day before and called the delivery a "hostile ball". Agnew explained to listeners that Amir's boot was over the line "by a foot".

They then discussed the possibility that Amir could have done it on purpose in a bid to deliver the quicker ball closer to the batsman.

After the disgraceful cheating by Amir. Majeed rang back and told our man: "I'm not a joker, boss, okay? So you're confident?"

Grasping Majeed demanded yet another £10,000 payment. He said: "Try and get it to me four or five o'clock, yeah? Because I can give it to them as soon as they're finished, then that's done."

He explained how he was due to meet the team straight after close of

He explained how he was due to meet the team straight after close of play to accompany them to a charity dinner organised by the Pakistan Cricket Board. In an emotional interview after Friday's play on Friday. Amir hid his secret shame and told of his pride at bagging his first five-wlcket haul at Lord's.

The young bowler, who made a big show of kneeling to kiss the hallowed turf on reaching the landmark, told Test Match Special: "These moments are for me good. At Lord's I wanted my name on the (honours) board and I did it." He called the delivery that snared England's Alistair Cook-shortly before he carried out his third bent no-ball—the "most delightful wicket."

Our team will throw two ODIs

CALLOUS Majeed revealed he was plotting for Pakistan to lose TWO of the One Day Internationals (ODIs) against England next month.

He said: "Boss I'm telling you, the timing you've come into. It's perfect because the one days and Twenty20s are about to start and we're going to be making a hell of a lot money."

Incredibly, he said he could guarantee Pakistan would LOSE two one-dayers.

He explained many players want Test skipper Salman Butt to remain captain for all matches, but the Pakistanis have drafted in veteran Shahid Affold to lead the side for the one day internationals and Twenty20 matches. Majeed said:

"A lot of the hows

"They all want

"Let's say for example Twenty20,

mum runs they're going to concede. And the batsmen, I'm going to tell you how many, ilke say it was on the two opening batsman, Salman and Kamal, for example, you've only got twenty overs, they're going to waste two overs, three overs.

"The Twenty20s are easiest. Then the bowlers as well, yeah, they will certainly give a certain amount of runs and they're going to be batting as well and give their wickets. We'll finalise a price for each one and we'll just take it off the balance. We'll take it off the 150 (grand) balance until we're square."

And he reassured: "Boss believe me, you are talking to the right people."



FIXER Mazhar Majeed twice tried to rig the recent Third Test between England and Pakistan at the Oval to prove to our undercover reporters that he could do it.

porters that he could do it.

He demanded a £10,000 down payment before guaranteeing two no-balls on the second day of the match during a secret meeting outside a restaurant where he was dining with the team.

Then he stuffed the money into his jacket pocket before later opening up the coat in front of players to show them what he'd got.

But Majeed's plan was scuppered when the no-balls fix—already arranged for another gambling client and planned for the third day on August 20-had to be scrapped because the Pakistani bowling coach had warned his stars to tighten up their bowling.

Undaunted, the brazen crook then offered our man the guarantee that

offered our man the guarantee that

Pakistan skipper Salman Butt would score no runs from the first six balls he faced on the fourth day-a maiden over. Maajeed even phoned a number known to be linked to Butt to confirm it.

The player's secret signal to let gambling clients know that the cheating was on was to be Butt tapping midwicket with his bat during the over, as if flattening a bump.

However, again the fix was foiled. It was then that the focus shifted to fixing the current Test at Lord's.

Our fake betting syndicate front man had already met Majeed on August 16 and 18. But the first handover of cash in the matchingging scandal came on the evening of Thursday the 19th.

Proof

Majeed had invited our man to join him and the players for dinner at the Al Shishawi restaurant in London's Edgware Road. He introduced him to Pakistan captain Salman Butt and to players Wahab Riaz and Umar Amin. The property tycoon-whose company Bluesky Developments has

sponsored several high profile sporting events and charities—then borrowed Wahab's cream jacket to pop out to our man's Merc for a secret chat.

Majeed said: "Just to show you two no-balls tomorrow.
"Then you just pay as I said minimum for that, OK. Just £10,000. I'm telling you big money can be made."

He even offered to call the players in front of our man to prove he could control them: "You sit with me. OK. and I'll ring each player who I've got and even talk to them about it. Isn't that enough proof for you?"

Our man handed Majeed ten £1,000 bundles of notes in crisp £50 notes and he quickly showed them in his jacket pocket. Then he said: "I'm just going to give you two no-balls quite simple. And I'lt tell you which bowler's going to do it, and which ball he's going to do it in. This is just a taster. I'll let you know that tonight or tomorrow morning."

Showing his experience at match-fixing, he bragged: "Boss, I'm telling you, OK.

Then Majeed announced that our man would have to pay a huge deposit if he wanted to know the planned RESULTS of fixed matches so he could count it in by placing bets.

RESULTS of fixed matches so he could coin it in by placing bets. He added: "In terms of deposit, it's gonna be a minimum of £150,000. That's just for your trust. "That's for me to pay my boys, yeah, right a certain amount each, OK? Then they give me the authority to work with you. Once the authority is there to work with you. I'll give you everything we do. After that, I don't want any money up front, I just want the money paid after the

thing's done." But he said there would be no fixing the actual results of the Oval and Lord's Tests-"because we're trying to win this game and the Lord's game. Because we want Saiman Butt as captain."

Our man asked him: "Is he onside as well, is he in the fixing?" Majeed claimed: "Of course, of course."

He went onto boast of his past successes—saying, "Every single result we've done has come off, every single one"-before revealing that he and his bent players had arranged for Pakistan to lose some of the forthcoming One Day International matches against England.

"We've got one result already planned and that is coming in the next three and a half weeks," he said, "Paki-

stan will lose." Majeed aiso spelled out that he was aiready running matchrigging with other gambling syndicates, including "one party in India". With the dirty deal done, Majeed took our man into the restaurant and ordered captain Salman Butt and other teammates to join us. The piayers who were eating lamb and chicken kebabs, were relaxed in Majeed's company, joking with our reporters and sharing anecdotes about fellow cricketers.

After Majeed showed our team out of the restaurant he walked back to a group of his players standing outside

and opened the jacket into which he'd stuffed the money to show them what was inside. But on the Friday morning, Majeed rang our man saying that his bowlers

would not be able to bowl the two no-balls. He then invited our reporter to his luxurious home in Croydon on Saturday at 8am to discuss another possible fix before play at the Oval began.

The imposing house in Croydon is hidden behind electronic gates. A Range Rover, flash black Jaguar and Golf were parked in the drive.

Signal

Inside, Majeed claimed captain Butt would bat a maiden over just to prove that fixing was taking place. On one of his white BlackBerrys he uses as a "safe iine" to call players—which he says he disposes of every fortnight—he rang a number known to belong to Butt. He said:

"Boss, just stick to what we said last night OK? The first full over you play, you just make sure you play a maiden. OK? After the second ball, just go and tap the middle of the pilch as a signal."

Majeed said if Butt gave the signal then people around the world would know that it was time to put massive bets on as the fixing was about to take place.

He then boasted about the players he claimed were working for him in the betting scam-claiming to have seven on his books, including Butt. Asif, Amir and Kamran Akmal, the wicket-keeper already accused of match-fixing by the coach of the Pakistan team, Intikhab Alam.

Majeed also revealed how he laun-

ders match-fixing money through the football club he owns. Croydon Athletic in south London. "The only reason I bought a football club is to do that," he said. And he spilled the beans on how he helps his players hide their money.
"I've opened them all Swiss bank accounts as well, all numbered accounts," he said. "I've got them english bank accounts too."

To prove it he showed off bank details stored on his BlackBerry including a Clydesdale Bank account number he claimed was Butt's.
And to hammer home the amounts of money our man could win, Majeed called an Indian bookie he regularly deals with and asked him how

larly deals with and asked him how

much he would pay for a definite

Oval Test result. Majeed demanded \$1.2million but the bookie replied. "I'll give you one (milion)." Majeed-who has a wife Sheliza and two daughters aged 4 and 6-flicked through recordings on a TV to show off previous matches he claimed to have fixed.

Later. explaining why Butt did not bat the promised maiden over. Majeed told our man the pitch was too lively for the skipper to guarantee not accidentally edging the ball for a run.

"There was no signal," he said. "He obviously felt the ball was doing too much off the pitch and he couldn't do a maiden. I've not given you any wrong information."



CRICKET rigger Mazhar Majeed boasted that cheating in the sport is rife, with one controversial Test this year netting a shady betting syndicate more than £830,000.

dicate more than £830,000.

His revelation that fixes go on in all forms of the game-Tests, One Dayers and Twenty20-will horrify millions around the world who follow the sport.

And they will force cricket authorities to confront, once and for all, the match-fixing rumours that have dogged the noble game for years.

High on their list of investigations will be the Second Test between Australia and Pakistan in Sydney

last January.

At the start of the fifth and final day Pakistan were in a supremely dominant position...but managed to lose dramatically.

Australia led by a mere 49 runs with just two wickets of their second innings remaining and with only one recognised batsman left.

In extraordinary scenes, Australia's last two batting partnerships managed 124 runs. That set Pakistan the relatively easy target of 176 runs to win. But they were bowled out for just 139 and lost.

There were widespread accusations of cheating at the time.

Pakistani coaches raised doubts about wicketkeeper Kamran Akmal, who dropped four catches and missed an easy run-out.

Three of the dropped catches were off the bat of Michael Hussey, who went on to score 134 not out.

Scam

But today we provide evidence from vile Majeed's own mouth.

To the astonishment of our undercover team, he provided detail of how the test WAS rigged and how crooked gamblers pocketed 1.3million dollars (£837,000) from it.

The part-time Muslim TV channel presenter opened up during a meeting in our car outside the Bombay Brasserie restaurant in Gloucester Road, west London, on August 18. Explaining the scam he said: "Let me tell you the last test we did. It was the Second Test against Aus-

tralia in Sydney. Australia had two more wickets left. They had a lead of ten runs, yeah. And Pakistan had all their wickets remaining.

"The odds for Pakistan to lose that match, for Australia to win that match, were I think 40-1. We let them get up to 150 then everyone lost their wickets. That one we made 1.3. But that's what I mean, you can get up to a million. Tests is where the biggest money is because those situations arise."

Majeed then continued to detail how he runs his slick operation. Reporter: "Do we get information like there will be three no-balls in the third over?"

Majeed: "Of course, everything. And you get the indication to show if it's on or not. They'll change gloves at a certain point."

Reporter: "You will be relaying it."

Majeed: "Yeah, it all comes

The spoils of Majeed's sordid trade have brought him a life of iuxury in which he mixes with

He claimed: "Our production company used to do ali
the generic TV adverts for
Showtime Arabla. Showtlme
is the largest TV network in
the world. We made a film in
2006 calied Paradise Now which
won an Oscar and Golden Giobe.
Went down realiy well."
During an earlier meeting at London's Hilton Park Lane, the slippery

crook even name-dropped celebs he could invite to a launch party for our investigator's "business venture".

venture".

Majeed boasted: "I know a lot of footballers and I know a lot of English actors as well."

He then added that he knew one of the most famous Hollywood

actors "very well." The News of the World is not naming him but he is a global superstar.

Majeed also bragged of knowing one of the world's top tennis players and claimed he had arranged for Salman Butt to be in pictures with

pop stars and a world famous US rapper.

It was during the Bombay Brasserie meeting that he revealed the Oval test being played at the time against England, there's brackets. Like tomorrow (August 19) there is no bracket because the Indian market is not open. The third day (August 20) there's brackets.

"I give out the information the night before or morning. What's going to happen at the end of the fourth day, But we now are not going to do any results for the next two games because we want Salman

ing to do any results for the next two games because we want Salman Butt to be captain long term."
Then he outlined the prices bookies pay him for his information.
"The results, like brackets, we charge anything between £50,000 and £80,000 pounds per bracket.
"And for results, Twenty20 is about £400,000. No-balls is easy. No-balls, you know, there's not that much money anyway, we know that.
"You can make a bet if you wanted no-balls you could probably get up to £10,000 each, yeah. That's simple. "But in terms of results, depending on who we are playing, sometimes it can be £300,000. The max it can be is

on who we are playing, sometimes it can be £300,000. The max it can be is £450,000. You can speak to any bookie in India and they will tell you about this information and how much they'll pay, If you had the information and they knew that it was coming from the source they'd pay you that money themselves."

He said his prices were justified because he had to bribe senior players. Majeed explained: "If you've got six players, they're taking such a big risk, yeah."

In an earlier meeting, he had toid of the players' desire to get in on match-fixing. "They will be up for it. I told you they will be up for making

match-fixing. "They will be up for it.

I told you they will be up for making money. They need to make money."
His name-dropping and endless bragging was interrupted by phone calls from Pakistan captain Butt and keeper Akmai. But two-faced Majeed wasted no time in having a go about his own players.

He said: "You'll find there's only a few players who are genuine and

who are actually here for the love of the game and there's not many be-lieve me. A lot of them are just look-ing for money, women and food. "They make money and they need to make money. The problem is if

they don't then they're not going to have enough money for the rest of their lives. In cricket there's not enough money.

"How much they're getting paid is a joke. I came from a football background and I can see the difference in football and cricket. It's huge."

Majeed, who runs a property company with a multi-million pound portfolio called Bluesky Developments, also admitted being party to ball tanipering, another cheating ruse that has blighted cricket.

He shamlessly claimed: "I used to go out on the pitch to give the play-

ers their drinks. Whenever we couldn't get a wicket I'd have a lump of Vaseline on my hand. Shake their hand. They'd put it on one side of the ball and the ball would suddenly start in-swinging." Today, after our astonishing revelations, Majeed's tampering with cricket has finally come to an end.

shocking money-grabbing scheme is not the first time she tried to cash in on her link to Prince Andrew behind his back, the News of the World can reveal.

We were tipped off by a whistleblower that the devious Duchess had been endangering the royal family's security and putting her ex-husband's good reputation on the line.

And at the meetings which followed she was always keen to point out how hard up she is-even claiming during one conversation with our man that she hadn't "a pot to p*s in".

The duchess faces a High Court action for unpaid bills amounting to almost 200,000. Her New York Company Hartmoor-founded to encompass various ventures-folded with

Our source told us that when Fergie met the man she began negotiating with him to meet unsuspecting Prince Andrew even though he showed her NO CREDENTIALS and had only a mobile phone number to give her as contact. She did not bother to check out his background. "She told him she could fix up meetings between him and Prince Andrew in Kazakstan and Abu Dhabi," said our source.

"As long as Sarah thinks you are rich she will be all over you like a rash. She will say she can arrange meetings with Andrew even though he has no idea what is going on. It's incredible."

It was a modus operandi the Duchess repeated when our undercover reporter, posing as a wealthy infiltrated Fergie's closest circle of associates.

The word soon got to her that our man was interested in her introduction service to Prince Andrew.

It led to an initial meeting with her for dinner at the famous New York boutique hotel, The Mark, on May 13.

She was accompanied by two assistants. Over a glass of vodka and tonic, the Duchess began with some small talk, announcing that she is writing a new book.

"It's going to help men with how to deal with irritating, greedy wives,

who are completely out of control," she boasted, oblivious to the irony of what she'd said.
But moments later Fergie began to make her pitch, telling us she had her ex-husband so much in her pocket that she still lives in the same house—a guest room at the 30-bedroom Royal Lodge in Windsor. She she boasted that he called her "five times a day". "We're the happiest divorced couple in the world," she said. Then she began her sales pitch, proudly telling our reporter: "He's ambassador for trade".

Effectively, Andrew is our Government's super salesman for UK business abroad—and works hard to develop relationships in the Middle East, South East Asia, India, China and North Africa.

Since he started work in 2001, he has helped dozens of British firms try to win business abroad including Roll Royce, Shell and HSBC. Sarah ensured our man knew the benefits of such a contact and reeled off details of the Prince's movements in an astonishing breach of

ments in an astonishing breach of

ments in an astonishing breach of royal security.

As the ordered lobster arrived on the dinner table, Fergie then made her first move to get our reporter and Andrew together-by inviting a "businessman" she barely knew into the heart of a royal residence-the Duke's country home and former official residence of the late Queen Mother, in the shadow of Windsor Castle.

Talk

"What I want you to do next is to meet Andrew," she said. "At this moment he's someone you really need to meet, not just because of the man he is.

"So as soon as you come to London, come to Royal Lodge. I'll introduce you and sit down, and you'll talk to him about whatever." After that first meeting. Fergie reported

back to our source who was acting as intermediary. In a phone call she pretended she had set up the deal-and named her price.

She said: "OK, well I spoke to, Billy and Billy is happy to meet with him but (he) has to know that

for Billy to meet with him etc, etc, he has to give me £500,000."

She also told her pal to ask our man to arrange the \$40,000 deposit she wanted in cash so she could pay off bills.

Then came the meeting on Tuesday at top London restaurant Mosiman's followed by a trip to what she believed was our man's Mayfair apartment In which she set about clinching the deal.

During the negotiations, the duchess indiscreetly spilled the beans about her financial hardship and her relationship with the royals. Revealing her divorce settlement was



THE Duchess of York has always had a unique talent for reinventing herself.

She has ridden a rollercoaster of Royal scandal for years with breathtaking sexual and financial indiscretions.

Somehow, she has always bounced back. But with the "cash for royal access" scandal, Sarah has plumbed new depths.

When she married Prince Andrew in 1986, even the hard-to-please Duke of Edinburgh saw the daughter of Charles's risque polo manager Major Ronnie Ferguson as a breath of fresh air through a monarchy seen as out of touch.

She had a job, with a publishing firm. She had had at least two previous relationships, with a ski instructor, Kim Smith-Bingham, and a racing driver, Paddy McNally.

But the expectations were impossible. She has claimed that her royal marriage was doomed because she saw Andrew, a serving Naval officer then, an average of 40 days in each of the first five years. Without Andrew

each of the first five years. Without Andrew there to "protect" her, she was exposed. She

was dubbed "The Duchess of Pork" after putting on weight. Her next nickname was "Freebie Fergie" after accepting gifts of clothes and holidays.

Sarah spoke publicly of how she "worshipped" her husband, was derided for leaving behind firstborn Beatrice when she joined him in Australia and was criticised for her many foreign trips. The 50-room house she had built in Sunninghill Park was dubbed "South York" after the glitzy mansion in TV's Dallas and branded vulgar.

She has always loved the jetset lifestyle. In 1990 she flew to Morocco in the private plane of American millionaire, Steve Wyatt, who was soon calling her "Mah woman" in his Texan drawl.

She was brazen about the relationship. In March 1992, photographs of the pair on holiday with Beatrice and Eugenie were discovered at a flat previously rented by Wyatt in

It was the final straw. Within weeks, Andrew and Sarah's separation was announced.

Within months, that "scandal" was overshadowed by publication of photographs of the bare-breasted duchess having her toes sucked by her financial adviser, Wyatt's pal Johnny Bryan.

She later complained that the Palace "Old Guard" ganged up on her, later confirmed when the the Queen's former private secretary, the late Lord Charteris, described Fergie as "vulgar, vulgar, vulgar".

After a briefing at the Palace with two senior courtiers, a veteran BBC correspondent famously emerged to report: "The knives are out for Fergie at the Palace."

They were, and it was the end of the marriage. She was stripped of her HRH title and hung out to dry. She was also in serious debt. After her divorce in 1996, she was said to have owed as much as £3 million to Coutts Bank. Sarah was forced to cash in on her royal name and reinvent herself in America.

She did so with aplomb—clearing her bank debt with a successful career in the US where she earned millions as the face of WeightWatchers until last year.

More recently, she produced the successful film "Young Victoria". She has also made TV films, documentaries, and touted herself on the lecture circuit.

But Brand Fergie finally came unstuck in the US, and last year she had to come home and seek refuge with loyal Andrew.

Morley.
The once-close friends invested hundreds of thousands of pounds launching Hartmoor in a blaze of publicity in 2006. They were pictured at several US functions together as they pumped in more money and encouraged others to invest too.

Sarah and Morley were forced to pay back creditors after taking out a loan understood to be as much as £667.000.

She has no home of her own, but has a trust fund, intellectual property such as her book character Budgie the Little Helicopter, antique art and furniture that could be used as surety.

The Duchess and Morley—who covered his losses out of his own pocket— were forced to pay thousands of dollars of unpaid US tax bills. Both refused to file for bankruptcy, as they feared that move would cause them "embarrassment". Instead they vowed to settle their huge debts.

Once again Sarah tried to bounce back. She announced that rights to her Little Red children's books had been sold to a Hollywood studio, and she flagged up that she was about to secure a deal to make a TV documentary series.

Now she is clearly desperate. She says she is close to bankruptcy.

One of the reasons—apart from her compulsive spending—is the fact that the British royal family hung her out to dry when she and Prince Andrew divorced in 1996.

She secured an absurdly paltry divorce deal—£15,000 a year, which was half his Royal Navy salary at the time. She was left with no house, no car, not even that pot.

The settlement was more about ensuring the couple's two daughters were cared for and permitting Fergie to stay friends with the royal family, the Queen in particular.

Now she has come back to haunt them once again, despite being excluded from royal family gatherings for years.

She is not on the guestlist for official events. Even at Christmas, her children go off to Sandringham without her.

Some have felt sorry for her. But she has exhausted any remaining sympathy today.

Clearly Prince Philip, who is the head of family matters for the Windsors, knows his ex-daughter—warts and all—better than anyone.

Now we know why he has been so determined to set her adrift. She is nothing more than a liability.



MILLIONAIRE World Snooker champion John Higgins is captured here on camera shaking hands on a disgraceful deal to fix a string of high-profile matches after demanding a £300,000 kickback.

The scandal will cast a dark shadow over the final of this year's champion-ship which starts today and disgust the millions of fans tuning into the BBC to watch their sporting idols.

After 34-year-old Higgins' shock defeat in the tournament at the hands of veteran Steve Davis, he flew to the Ukrainian capital of Kiev and in a meeting with undercover News of the World investigators on Friday shamelessly:

• AGREED to deliberately LOSE frames in four matches so that illegal gambling syndicates could

illegal gambling syndicates could clean up.

HAGGLED over the best ways to cover up the bribe-finally settled at Euro 300,000 (2561,000).

BRAGGED it was "easy" to fool fans into believing they were watching genuine snooker action.

Astonishingly, the entire deal was set up and agreed with Higgins' agent Pat Mooney, a board memeber of the World Professional Snooker and Billards Association and one of the sport's top four officials charged with POLICING officials charged with POLICING the game.

Crooked

At first. Greedy Mooney and Higgins saw the chance of making a legal fortune out of our team, who were posing as businessmen interested in organising a series of events linked to the World Snooker Series-effectively a European Tour of snooker.

But they could not resist the

lure of making extra illegal cash on the side from game fixing.

During the 10-minute conversation that sealed their crooked deal Higgins never once questioned the legality or morality of cheating for cash.

Instead he was more interested in how he could HIDE the massive payments he'd get.

Asked by our man if there was any danger he might not be able to deliver on his promise to lose a certain frame, Higgins—who was awarded the MBE for his services to sport—insisted: "It's easy, it's easy!"

Then came the subject of how he'd get paid and he bleated: "But then I'm thinking to myself how do I swallow 300,000 pounds or Euros coming in...?"

Father-of-three Higgins—who has won the coveted world crown three times and is nicknamed the Wizard of Wishaw—was not worried about the disgrace his tricks could bring on the game.

He was more concerned about covering his back.

team, who he'd met for the first time just hours earlier. Having raised the subject of match fixing with Higgins' grasp-ing manager Mooney at previous meetings, our investigators sat down with the two men on Friday morning to sort out the mechanics of the scam.

Not that the star needs the money-he has banked more than \$\Sigma\$ million prize money since turning professional in 1992 and winning his first tournament two years later.

As the talks continued, Higgins-now playing an active role in the discussions-had his own ideas about how the cash could be paid over without raising the suspicions of the authorities.

His admission came after our undercover team posed as would-be sponsors to get close to Calzaghe following a tip-off from a worried friend. In a series of meetings the Welsh ring legend:

ADMITTED he takes cocaine and gave advice on WHERE to buy it.

CLAIMED a relative actually SUPPLIES drugs.

NAMED a well-known soap star pal who he said could get him cocaine.

BBAD-MOUTHED fellow boxers including his pal Ricky Hatton.

Our investigation will shatter multi-millionaire Calzaghe's clean cut image-nurtured on TV's

Strictly-and cast a shadow over his astonishing boxing record of 46 wins which resulted in him being honoured TWICE at Buckingham Palace. We approached Calzaghe through his dad, boxing trainer Enzo. His son, who retired undefeated last year after holding super-middleweight and light heavyweight crowns, jumped at the chance to meet us at an apartment in London's Mayfair.

He turned up casually dressed in jeans, jacket and flat cap and immediately began bragging about his amazing record:

"Eleven years world champion and undefeated for 17 years, that's quite a long time!" he said.

But the conversation soon turned to drugs.

But the conversation soon turned to drugs.

As he chatted to our reporters
Calzaghe's nose was constantly running—one of the comon signs of heavy cocaine use.

When our reporter said he knew about taking cocaine, Calzaghe relaxed and said: "I guessed that, I could tell."

As he downed a ON HATT

glass of champagne Calazghe, 38, casually asked: "Have you got any stuff on you now?"

He added: "I know the score, I done bits and pieces myself. Don't tell my dad for f*** sake! He's no idea

tell my dad for f*** sake! He's no idea.

"Of course, I do a bit, but the thing is most of it is f***ing s*** in Wales. In London it's not too bad."

Keen to get snorting, Calzaghe telephoned one of his pals—a well-known soap actor—who he said might be able to pop round with some coke.

But the star, who we are not naming for legal reasons, was busy and couldn't turn up in time.

Calzaghe then showed his extensive knowledge of the drug scene in his hometown of Newbridge, South Wales.

When told that the drug was not even pure cocaine, Calzaghe explained: "The thing is now, especially in Britain, there's all s*** going out and you don't know what the f*** it is.
"So they into sell it and they have it.

"So they just sell it and they buy it and it's f**oing s***. It's like rubblsh."

Gamble

Then Calzaghe revealed that one of his own relatives back home in Wales also takes cocaine.
"He does a bit now and again," confided Calzaghe. "He always pays like 40, 50 quid."

In fact, at a later meeting in Los Angeles, the boxer went further and said the relative could actually SUPPLY us with the drug. "He's very handy," he said. "He'll sort you out next time you're there."

Back in Mayfair our reporter claimed he often bought drugs in

London nightclubs but the quality

London nightclubs but the quality was poor.

Calzaghe, now in full flow, revealed his knowledge of the seedy drug scene, chipping in: "F***ing hell it's a risk you take isn't it'? It's a gamble isn't it? But £100 is a f***ing joke."

He then grabbed a cigarette from our reporter's hand, believing it to be a cannabis joint and said: "Is that a spliff? That's marijuana isn't it? Can I have a f***ing puff?"

Over dinner big-headed Calzaghe-known as The Italian Dragon because of his Welsh-Italian background-lashed out at some of his fellow boxers-starting with his mate RICKY HATTON.

He said: "The main thing is your health. Look at Ricky Hatton for instance. You know he was knocked out really badly the last fight, knocked out two fights ago, and the reality is he's done himself a lot of

damage.

"Regardless of when he fights again, and he says he's going to fight, he's been knocked out by a nobody hasn't he, because his punch resistance has gone as far as I'm

concerned." Then the gloves came off as he tore into PRINCE NASEEM HAMED.

HAMED.

"Naseem, he's living in London now." he said.

"Obviously he had that episode didn't he, where he went to prison (sentenced to 15 months after a 90mph car crash).

"He's quite big. He's only like five foot two. He's quite a size now."

Next Calzaghe had a swipe at young British boxing hero AMIR KHAN.
"He's not exceptional." he said. "If

"He's not exceptional," he said. "If he fights against a tall guy he'll be knocked out again. He can't fight a

"He's been down like six times in "He's been down like six times in his career. It's early times and he's been down six times.

In 26 years of box-ing I went down four times."

four times."
Calzaghe then laid into soccer stars whining that they are paid too much while boxers struggle to make

ends meet. He said: "They're just a'ses, overpaid clowns. They're just idiots. They get in a week what I got for a fight, plus sponsorship.
"Some fighters pay 25 per cent to the manager, 10 per cent to the trainer, then you get one or two per cent taken off by the British Boxing Board of Control, and you get the rest minus training expenses—and rest minus training expenses-and then you get tax.

Legacy

"Some fights you're lucky to see a

"Some fights you're lucky to see a million.
"Some fighters have got a day job. Duke McKenzie. five times world champion and he couldn't give up the day job."
Calzaghe added: "I thought 'quit while I'm ahead' but I've still got it in me-because my last couple of fights were probably my best performances

"But you weigh things up, listen to your body. I could have carried on but why? Eventually you're going to

get beat. To retire undefeated is a rare commodity. Nobody retires. Being undefeated your legacy grows, you have one defeat and you're like everybody else."

Calzaghe has certainly done very well out of his boxing career. Divorced Calzaghe who has two sons aged 15 and 12, has homes in Chelsea and Wales, a luxurious villa in Barbados and has invested in property in Yucatan. Mexico.

But it's adding cocaine to his champagne lifestyle that has cost him dear.

Our tip-off came from one of his closest pals, who told us: "Since Joe's given up boxing he's basically become a coke user. A few of us have urged him to stop but he doesn't listen. He started off doing it with some of his friends in Wales but now it's more often.

"After his ring career came to an end he's just gone wild, doing everything he couldn't do while he was in sport. He's gone off the rails, he's dumped his long-term partner, done the dancing show and thinks he has a career in films But his drug taking

is an open secret among mates and is definitely affecting his judgement."
A fortnight ago Caizaghe headed to Los Angeles for a break with his stunning new girlfriend, Russian dancer Kristina Rihanoff—the professional he was partnered with on last year's Strictly.
Calzaghe publicly ditched long-term girlfriend, model Jo-Emma Larvin, soon after meeting Kristina.
Talking about the show with our man, Calzaghe said with a huge grin: "When they asked me who do you want to do it with. I told them to find me someone single and pretty! If I'd paid more attention to dancing than trying to pull her I might have done all right. I was kicked out in week five!"
Calzaghe brought Kristina along to meet our reporters again at the Beverly Hillon, in Beverly Hills, Los Angeles. It was there he promised a relative would supply us cocaine when we got back to Wales, When Calzaghe invited our reporters to visit him again at his dad's

porters to visit him again at his dad's

gym in a dingy industrial estate in Newbridge he showed off his ring skills, pounding punchbags hanging from the ceiling.

Then Calzaghe got furious as he leafed through a boxing magazine which rated LENNOX LEWIS as Brit-ain's number one all-time great, with himself at number two.

Power

"I should be number one!" he fumed. "Look at his record, 42 won and two lost. That's a disgrace. He's been down twice. I'm the only undefeated fighter!"

Dad Enzo joined in with his own firade on Britain's top boxers, starting with Amir Khan.
"I wouldn't touch him with a bargepole," said Enzo. "I don't want him in my stable. I don't think he's a class fighter, he's manufactured."

But yesterday Enzo was having to face the shame and downfall of his own protegé—as son Joe was forced

to take the agonising decision to confess he had finally been caught with his guard down.

His full statement to the News of the World said:

"I very much regret my occasional use of cocaine in what have sometimes been the long days since my retirement from the ring.

"I am fully aware of the bad example it sets to other people and particularly to youngsters and I apologise to my family, friends and fans.

"It is not a major problem in my life but it is something which I am actively addressing.

"Many of the other conversations reported to have taken place simply involve men joshing or shooting the breeze over a drink.

"While some statements are either untrue or exaggerations I am, naturally, sorry for any embarrassment their publication may cause to entirely blameless third parties."




